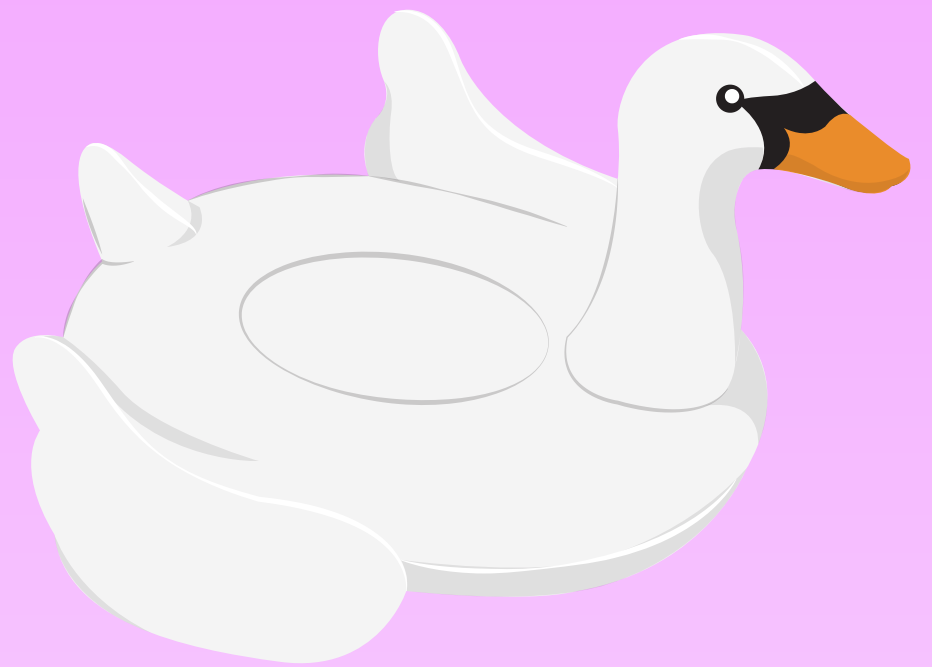


# A guide to pool toys

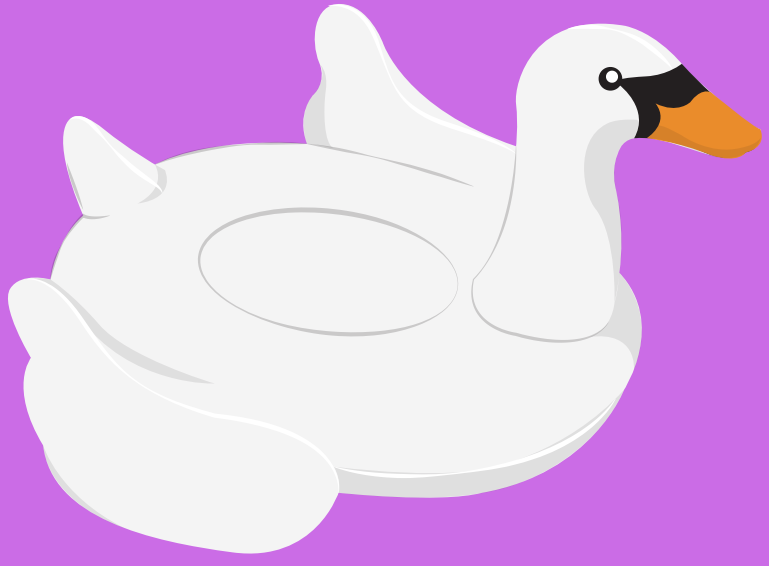
- **Pool toys are used for water play**



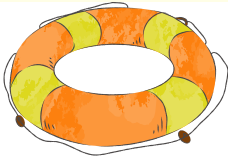
- **Pool toys are not safety devices**



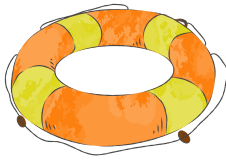
- **Pool toys do not replace adult supervision**



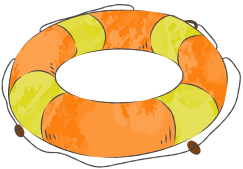
# Pool Toys



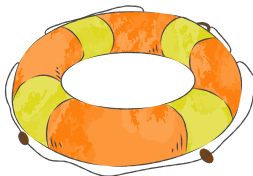
There are many different types of pool toys such as noodles, dive rings, kickboards, beach balls and floaties.



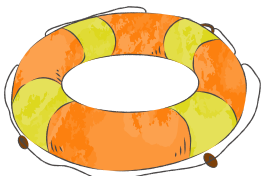
Things such as floaties or noodles can make children seem more confident in the water and provide a false sense of security when it comes to the child's ability in the water.



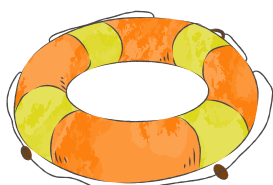
It is **NEVER** safe to leave a child unattended in a pool or pool area.



Although pool toys present dangers around water they can also be used to save lives.



In emergency situations pool toys can be used to reach or throw out to aide in rescuing someone in need.



Sun and chemical exposure, such as chlorine and salts, can deteriorate pool equipment making them unsafe to use in the water.
